

#### **EMERGENCY SHELTER:**

short-term shelter—Includes Hotel/Motel Voucher Beds

Families with children—493 beds \* Single adults—614 beds



# TRANSITIONAL HOUSING:

longer-term (up to 24 months) shelter with more intensive services

Families with children—153 beds \* Single adults—104 beds

Homelessness (n.): The condition of living in an emergency or transitional shelter or sleeping in a place not meant for human habitation.

Note: This definition does not include staying with family or friends, living in motel, or living in crowded or substandard conditions.

#### **PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING:**

for families or individuals with a disability who need long-term housing that is connected to ongoing supportive services—No longer considered homeless.

Families with children—36 beds of which 12 families (45 beds) were residing in \* Single adults—142 beds of which 122 individuals were residing in



#### **Other PERMANENT HOUSING Options:**

for individuals and is designed to house only one person at a time—No longer considered homeless..

Single adults—62 beds of which 62 individuals adults were residing in

### Rapid ReHousing—There were 226 (400 persons) Households in Rapid Re Housing Programs

Rapid rehousing programs help FAMILIES and INDIVIDUALS living on the streets or in emergency shelters solve the practical and immediate challenges to obtaining permanent housing while reducing the amount of time they experience homelessness, avoiding a near-term return to homelessness, receiving case management/support, and linking to community resources that enable them to achieve housing stability in the long-term—*No longer considered homeless*.
